The Scientific Committee of ISAAR 2015 welcomes the submission of abstracts for poster presentation. Detailed instructions will be provided with the notice of acceptance to presenters.

General guidelines

>> Abstracts must be only submitted via the website (www.isaar.org) in order to meet the abstract deadline. Please prepare an abstract according to the instructions for submission below or on the website. The submission of an abstract does not constitute registration on the symposium. Presenting authors of abstracts should submit their registration form together

with their abstracts.

>> Deadline for abstract submission is [March 2, 2015](#). Notifications of acceptance will be sent to corresponding authors by [March 9, 2015](#). Scheduling information and instructions on poster preparation will be included with this notification. Authors whose abstract(s) is(are) accepted must register for the symposium by

[March 15, 2015](#) if they have not already done so. Failure to do so will result in the abstract being withdrawn from the program.

>> Corresponding authors are responsible for ensuring that all co-authors have read and approved the abstract submission.

>> Submissions not conforming to established submission guidelines will not be reviewed.

Abstracts must be submitted through the ISAAR 2015 website. Please prepare the abstract in accordance with the instructions below.

>> Abstracts must be typed, single spaced, using [Times New Roman typeface in 10 point size only](#). Abstract text must be single line spaced and justified at the left margin only. Do not leave blank lines between paragraphs. Do not indent.

>> Abstract title should appear in **bold**. Do not indent. The title should be concise and reflect the content of the abstract.

>> [Use first initial followed by last name](#). Omit degrees. For paper submissions, place an asterisk (*) after the name of the author presenting the paper. On a separate line, type as succinctly as possible the names of institutions and countries.

>> Leave one line blank in between the title/author block and the abstract text. The abstract text should include [background, methods, results, and conclusion](#).

>> Each abstract may contain up to a [maximum of 1,800 characters](#), including title, author's name and affiliations and the abstract text (Spaces are not counted).

>> Use italics only when appropriate (e.g. for names of genus and species). Simple table and graphs (nest and in black ink) may be included.

>> Abstracts will be published as submitted, i.e. any error appearing in the submitted abstract will appear in the publish abstract book.

>> Each abstract must be submitted in electronic form as an [MS Word for Windows](#) document.

Young scientist travel award & outstanding poster award

Young scientist travel award & outstanding poster awards will be given to some selected posters. The Scientific Committee will make the final judgement for awards and will inform award

winners in advance. Abstracts must be based on results that have not been published in any journal or presented at any national or international scientific conference prior to April 1, 2015.

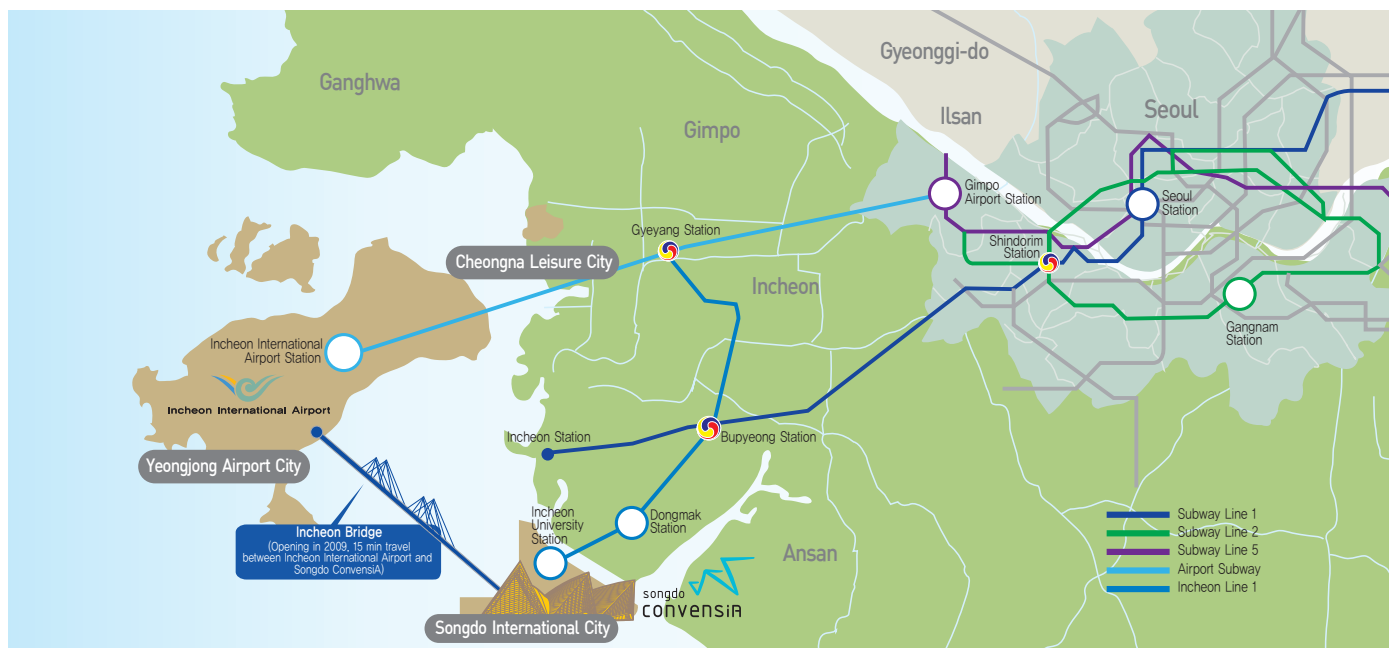
GENERAL INFORMATION

About Korea

Rich natural beauty combined with a unique historical and cultural heritage makes Korea a delightful place of discovery for international travelers. Despite the nation's rapid modernization, Koreans still adhere to their traditional values, such as the age-old Confucian respect for their elders.

The Korean Peninsula extends northeastern part of the Asian continent. The Peninsula shares its northern border with China and Russia. To its east is the East sea, beyond which neighboring Japan lies. In addition to the mainland peninsula, Korea includes some 3,000 islands.

Seoul is the capital of Korea. The word 'Seoul' means capital in traditional Korean. Seoul is a city in which the Han River flows through, from east to west, and is surrounded by great mountains, and the city contains both history and tradition, as well as the latest IT technology, making it a kind of a city which is quite rare anywhere on the globe.

Korea has four distinct seasons - spring, summer, fall and winter. Spring runs from March through May with blue skies and gentle sunshine. Temperatures range from low of 15°C to high of 20°C in May.

Outlets for 220 volts 60 cycle are dominant. Always check the power supply before using your equipment.

A local call costs ₩70 for three minutes. To make an international call, first dial the international dialing code (001, 002, 005, 006, 008), then the country code, area code, and finally the individual number. You may rent a cell phone at the airport.

Tax & Tipping

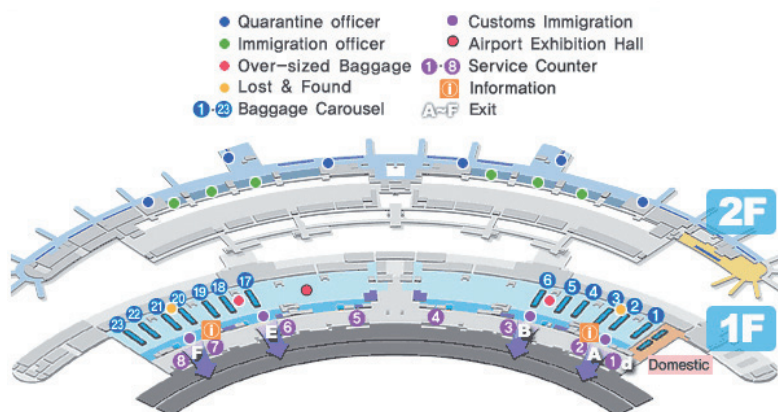
Value-added tax is levied on most goods and services at a standard rate of 10% and is included in the retail price. Tipping is not customary in Korea. In tourist hotels, a 10% service charge is added to the bill.

Credit Cards

There will be no problem in using your credit card in Korea where American Express, Diners Club, Visa, Master Card, and JCB, are widely accepted.

Taxi rates, depending on traffic and weather you use regular or deluxe, costs from 30,000 Won to 40,000 Won. KAL Limousine-bus and other city bus services shuttles around major hotels, including venue, and costs between 2,800 Won to 7,500 Won. You may also arrange for a private chauffeur ahead of time with your hotel concierge.

About Incheon

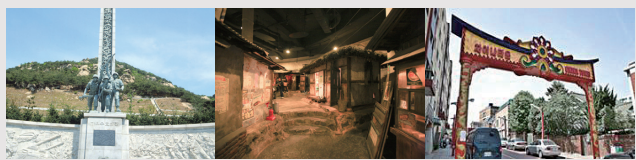
Yeongjongdo Island _ Yeongjongdo Island is located 2.5 km northwest of Wolmido Island, Incheon. It is connected now by Yeongjong Bridge to the mainland, it no longer has the proper atmosphere of an island, but since the building of Incheon International Airport, many tourists have been coming here to visit.

Wolmi Park _ After Wolmido Island was zoned to be developed as a tourist attraction in 1918 by Incheon city, sea water baths, beaches, entertainment centers, botanical gardens and other facilities were built to attract visitors from all over the place during the summer. It was renamed as Wolmi park from Wolmi amusement park.

China Town _ Incheon's Chinatown area came into being with the opening of the Incheon Port in 1883 and Incheon's designation as an extraterritoriality of the Ching Dynasty. In the past, the area held many stores trading goods imported from China, but most Chinese businesses are now restaurants.

Freedom Park (Jayu Park) _ Nestled in Mt. Eungbongsan in Incheon Metropolitan City, Jayu Park was first called Manguk Park and then Seo Park as the Japanese power became stronger. During the colonial rule of Japan, there was another park called Dong Park (East Park), which was created and used as a shrine by the Japanese

The Memory Hall for Incheon Landing Operation _ Located in Ongnyeondong, Yeosu-gu in Incheon Metropolitan City, the Incheon Landing Operation Memorial Hall is a war memorial hall built to commemorate the centennial anniversary of the opening of Incheon Port in 1984. Its theme centers on the successful Incheon Landing Operation led by UN Commander in Chief General McArthur during the Korean War.

Sudoguksan Museum _ The museum is located within Songhyun Park, Dong-gu Incheon. Consisting of two floors (one aboveground, one belowground) the museum exhibits the life of citizens living in 'daldongne' (the impoverished hillside areas). It exhibits reproductions of various scenes of daily life from the 1960s and 1970s, people at: a barbershop, a store selling coal briquettes, a small sundries store, and a communal water supply area and restroom. In the museum, visitors can play dice games, change coal briquettes, and try on school uniforms of the past, as well as purchase souvenirs.

Various performances, exhibitions and educational programs are on progress. The inner part of Tribowl with 3 stories has an exterior-reversed shape.

Incheon Bridge _ Completed in October 2009, the Incheon Bridge is a six-lane bridge linking Yeongjongdo (where the Incheon International Airport is located) and Songdo International City. Stretching over 2.38km, it is the largest and longest bridge in Korea. The British weekly magazine 'Construction News,' published a special report in December 2005, praising the bridge as one of the 'Top Ten Architectural Wonders of the World.' Yeongjongdo Island is home to the Incheon Bridge Memorial Hall, which opened in March 2010 and displays information about the Incheon Bridge, including construction methods/processes.

Cheongwadae (Sarangchae) _ The newly opened Cheongwadae Sarangchae, which opened to the public on January 5th, 2010, is a history center that gives visitors a chance to follow in the footsteps of presidents of Korea and gain insight into the history of Seoul. The Cheongwadae Sarangchae encompasses the past, present and even the future of Seoul as well as the entire nation. It serves as a tourist information center that offers detailed information on World Cultural

Heritage sites and assets.

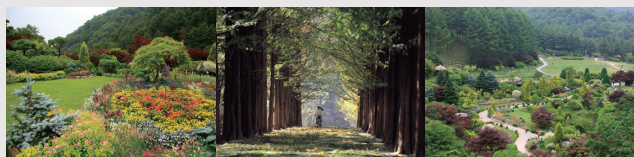
Gyeongbok Palace _ Built in 1395, Gyeongbokgung Palace is also commonly referred to as the "Northern Palace" because it is the furthest north when compared to the neighboring palaces of Changdeokgung (Eastern Palace) and Gyeongheegung (Western Palace). Gyeongbokgung Palace is arguably the most beautiful and remains the grandest of all five palaces. The premises were destroyed by fire during the Imjinwaeran War (Japanese Invasion, 1592-1598). However, all of the palace's 7,700 rooms were later restored under the leadership of Heungseondaewongun during the reign of King Gojong (1852-1919). Remarkably, the most representative edifices of the Joseon Dynasty, Gyeonghoe-ru Pavilion and Hyangwonjeong Pond are still relatively in tact. Woldae and the sculptures of Geunjeongjeon (The Royal Audience Chamber) represent past sculpture of contemporary art.

Insadong Alley _ Insa-dong, located in the heart of the city, is an important place where old but precious and traditional goods are on display. There is one main road in Insadong with alleys on each side. Within these alleys are galleries, traditional restaurants, traditional teahouses, and cafes. The galleries are the heartbeat of Insa-dong. There are about 100 galleries in the area and you can see every example of traditional Korean fine art from paintings to sculptures. The teahouses and restaurants are the perfect complement to the galleries. At first they might be hard to find, but if you take the time to stroll around the twisting alleyways, the window shopping in itself can be very entertaining. The shops in Insa-dong are very popular among all age groups, because each one is unique.

Gwanghwamun Square _ On August 1st, 2009, the redesigned Gwanghwamun Square opened to the public. With the inauguration of the square, Sejong-ro, located at the center of the 600-year-old historic city of Seoul, was transformed into a human-centered space that harmonizes with the beautiful scenery of Gyeongbokgung Palace and Bukaksan Mountain. The close to 20,000 m² Gwanghwamun Square is located at the center of Sejong-ro which connects Gwanghwamun Gate and Cheonggye Square.

N Seoul Tower _ Seoul Tower opened to the public on October 15, 1980 and has since become a major tourist attraction. The 236.7m Seoul Tower sits atop Namsan Mountain (243m), Seoul Tower offers panoramic views of Seoul and the surrounding areas. The view is so stunning that many consider Seoul Tower the best tower in Asia. Thirty years and countless visitors later, as the structure was renamed 'N Seoul Tower.' The letter 'N' stands for the tower's 'new' look, which resulted from a 15 billion won remodeling in Dec 2005. With the new lighting system and changes to the tower's overall color scheme, event coordinators can now decorate the tower for each new season or event. Currently, an ongoing lighting theme titled 'Flower of Seoul,' uses searchlights to light up the tower each night from 7pm to midnight.

Nami Island _ Namiseom Island was formed as a result of the construction of the Cheongpyeong Dam. It is a half moon shaped (462,809m²) isle, and on it is the grave of General Nami, who led a great victory against the rebels in the 13th year of the 7th king of the Joseon Dynasty, King Sejo (reign 1455 ~ 1468). Namiseom Island is 63 km away from Seoul in the direction of Chuncheon, and is famous for its beautiful tree lined roads. The complex is 553,560 square yards with chestnut trees and poplar trees around the isle. In the middle of the isle, there is a grass field about 316,320 square yards.

The Garden of Morning Calm _ The Garden of Morning Calm, a 30,000m² flower garden, opens year-round for your enjoyment. The moment you enter the garden, you will see that it is a paradise for photographers, tourists, families and couples. The thousands of varieties of flowers coupled with pine trees release an unforgettable aroma into the air that causes all worries to quickly melt away.

Seokguram Grotto _ Seokguram, located on Mt.Tohamsan, is the representative stone temple of Korea. The official name of Seokguram, National Treasure No. 24, is Seokguram Seokgul. Designated as World Cultural Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1995, it is an artificial stone temple made of granites. Seokguram is known to have been built with Bulguksa Temple. According to the history book Samgukyusa of the Goryeo Dynasty (the country that unified the Korean peninsula at the end of the Silla Dynasty, 918~1392), Kim Dae-Seong had built Bulguksa for the parents who were alive, and Seokguram for the parents of his former life. Seokguram is an artificial stone temple made of granites, and is located on the eastern peak of Mt. Toham (745m sea level). Inside the round-shaped main hall, there are the Bonjon Statue, Bodhi-sattva and his disciples. Seokguram was built to preserve these statues. The Bonjon figure wearing a generous smile is seated on the stage engraved with lotus flower design. The rounded ceiling looks like a half-moon or a bow and has a lotus flower decorated cover on it. As the sunrise from this spot is so beautiful, many people climb the mountain at daybreak.

Bulguksa Temple _ Bulguksa Temple is the representative relic of Gyeongju and was designated as a World Cultural Asset by UNESCO in 1995. The beauty of the temple itself and the artistic touch of the stone relics are known throughout the world. Bulguksa Temple was built in 528 during the Silla Dynasty, in the 15th year of King Beop- Heung's reign (514~540). But during the Imjinwaeran War (the war provoked by Japan's invasion, 1592~1598) the wooden building was burned, 819 years after first being established.

Anapji Pond _ As said in the historical book of Samguk-sagi, during the 14th year of King Munmu's reign (AD 661~681) in the Silla period (57 BC~AD 935), a large pond was dug and small mountains were built all within the palace walls. Additionally, beautiful flowers were planted and rare animals were brought in to create an exquisite garden environment. It is at Wolseung (fortress erected in AD 101 during the Silla period) that we can find Anapji pond. In 1974, an excavation revealed large spherical shapes (measuring 200 meters in diameter and 180 meters in height) indicating that 3 islands were located in the pond.

Cheomseongdae Observatory _ Cheomseongdae is the oldest existing astronomical observatory in Asia. Constructed during the reign of Queen Seondeok (632~647), it was used for observing the stars in order to forecast the weather. This stone structure is a beautiful combination of straight lines and curves, and was designated as National Treasure No.31 on December 20th, 1962.

Mt.Seorak _ Seoraksan is the highest mountain in the Taebaek mountain range in the Gangwon province in eastern South Korea. It is located in a national park near the city of Sokcho. After the Hallasan volcano on Jeju Island and Jirisan in the south, Seoraksan is the third highest mountain in South Korea. The Taebaek mountain chain is often considered the backbone of the Korean peninsula. The national park attracts many national and international tourists all year round, but the main season for Seoraksan national park is autumn. The autumn colours in the area are considered amongst the most beautiful in Korea. The red and yellow forest is interrupted by rocks and small mountain streams flow amidst this. During the rainy season in summer—especially after a typhoon—these streams can swell. Perhaps the most visited part of the mountain is the main entrance valley to the National Park, a fifteen minute drive from Sokcho city. The valley runs west to east with a paved road leading up to the park's entrance gate.

Naksansa Temple _ Naksansa Temple is located 4km north of Naksan Beach, and boasts a 1,300-year history. It is a temple built by Ui-Sang, the ambassador of the 30th King of Silla Period (57 BC~AD 935), and inside there is the Seven Floor Stone Tower, Dongjong, Hongyaemun, together with several other cultural assets.

Yongdu Park _ At the western end of Jeju City, where the Hanch'on stream runs into the ocean, is a large rock formation shaped like a dragon's head. A short trail has been carved out going down the cliffs to give several views of the rock. Legend states that the Dragon King's messenger was sent to Halla Mountain to gather bulloch'o (a herb reputed to give eternal life). The messenger was killed by an arrow from an angry mountain god. Part of the messenger's body sank into the water while the head remained above the water, trying to return to the sky. On windy days, the waves crashing against the rocks suggest the fury of the dragon.

Yakchunsa Temple _ The architectural style of Yakcheonsa Temple is reminiscent of that of Buddhist temples of the early Joseon Dynasty. Measuring an impressive 30m high and spanning a total area of 3,305 meters squared, it is the largest temple in the East.

Jusangjeolli Cliff _ The Jusangjeolli are stone pillars piled up along the coast and is a designated cultural monument of Jeju Island. The Jusangjeolli was formed when the lava from Mt.Hallasan flew to the sea of Jungmun. They are rock pillars shaped like cubes or hexagons of various sizes. The administration of the district named them 'Jisatgae Rocks' from their old name 'Jisatgae'. It is also famous for its 20m cliff with the high tides and sea angling.

Seongup Folk Village _ Located at the foot of Mt. Halla on Jeju Island, Seongup Folk Village is a small town that holds a vast amount of culture. Cultural properties in the folk village have been handed down from generation to generation and include treasures such as residential houses, Confucian shrines and schools, ancient government offices, stone statues, large millstones (pulled by horses or ox), fortress ruins, and stone monuments. Among the cultural gems of the folk village are intangible cultural assets such as folk plays, native foods, local folk craftsmanship, and local dialect.

Seopjikoji _ Seopjikoji is located at the end of the eastern shore of Jeju-do Island. "Seopji" is the old name for the area, and 'Koji' is Jeju dialect meaning a sudden bump on land. Green fields without a single tree spread beyond the cliff to where a rock called "seondol" protrudes. Also there are stonewalls along the road to block the wind on the way to the lighthouse at the end of Seopjikoji. Going up the metal steps of the lighthouse, you can view the whole seashore at a glance. On Koji hill, there stands a stone Bongsudae (4 m high, 9 m long and wide) that retains its original form.

Seongsan Sunrise _ Near the eastern town of Songsan-ri, a volcanic crater with vertical cliffs rises up from the shore. As the easternmost tip of Jeju Island, this area is the first to greet each day's new sun, thus earning the name of "Sunrise Peak." A hefty climb brings visitors to the top of the peak. Visitors are prevented from entering the crater by barbed wire, but they can still enjoy the panoramic views of the surrounding area. Jagged rocks stick up like teeth along the crater's perimeter. It is definitely worth the view, even if you do not make it in time for the sunrise.
